Samsung is known for flooding the smartphone market with a range of devices, covering the full range of screen sizes, specifications, and price range. By following this policy, it basically means that there is a device out there that meets each individual's preferences, it has certainly worked to some extent. After all, Samsung has the largest smartphone market share in various markets around the world. One example is the fact that just a few months after the release of the TabPRO series of tablets, expected to be the company's top offer, we now have a new flagship series in the picture, with the Samsung Galaxy Tab S series. With tablets featuring different screen sizes, today, we will take a closer look at the smallest of the lot. Here's our comprehensive review of Samsung Galaxy Tab S 8.4! At first glance, the design of the Galaxy Tab S 8.4 will certainly look familiar, sharing a similar design language to its previous tablet counterparts. Samsung has, of course, had a lot of efforts to get things right, and it has to be said that the latest version is the best yet. Looking a lot like a blown-up Samsung Galaxy S5, the portrait orientation seems to be the default with this particular tablet, indicated by the placement of the signature button layout. As always, you can get a natural home button, framed by capacid back and recent keys apps. An investment with a subtle golden hue goes all the way around the sides in this white version of the tablet. Of course, looking at the sides, what is most noticeable is how thin the tablet is. With a thickness of just 6.6mm, the Galaxy Tab S 8.4 is one of the thinnest tablets around, struck only by another flagship, the Sony Xperia Z2 Tablet in portrait mode, speaker grills located at the top and bottom of the device, although this could be considered the sides when using the tablet in landscape orientation, which will happen while watching video. Placed on the right side are the power button and the volume rocker, above the microSD card slot, with the underside, which houses the microUSB port and headphone jack. After the appearance of the Galaxy S5, the back gets the hardware option of the smartphone, with a dimpled plastic cover that is not removable. Added to this rather controversial design option is a couple of cycles that can be used to attach various cases to the tablet. It is really the subtlety of this tablet that dictates its handling experience, which is really The tablet's grip on one hand is not difficult at all, and accessing items across the screen is easy enough, even as you type. Holding the tablet without turning on the screen is not as difficult either in landscape mode as the bezel offers a safe spot to rest your thumb. Samsung may not have changed the formula much, but eventually get as big as ever, with a body that is not only really elegant, but also easy to handle. Of course, the branding feature of this tablet is the addition of a super AMOLED display, which also features a high resolution of 2560 x 1600, resulting in a pixel density of 359 ppi. While we've seen such high-resolution displays on tablets in the past, this can undoubtedly be one of the highest quality displays available on a tablet. As with AMOLED screens, colors almost come off the screen with a punch quality on the face, resulting in a high contrast, which will definitely help in relation to media consumption. Binge watching a season and a half of Breaking Bad was incredibly enjoyable here, with such a high-quality screen, in a fairly accessible body of this size, allowing one of the best viewing experiences I've had on a tablet. In other uses such as paper garden, great brightness and wonderful colors make the magazine viewing experience about as good as it can get, without looking through a real magazine itself. You can cover the color temperature according to your preferences and it is possible to place it in Auto mode. In my experience, however, this is one of those features that you won't really notice, especially if you're done sticking with consistent interior lighting while using the tablet. Underneath all this is a performance package that can easily handle anything you can throw at this version of TouchWiz, whether it's watching videos on Netflix, browsing magazines, surfing the web, or playing games. The Galaxy Tab S 8.4 features the Exynos 5 Octa processor, with an ARM Cortex-A15 quad-core processor combined with an ARM Cortex-A7 quad-core processor, along with the Mali-T628 GPU. This is Samsung's tried and tested processing package, which, along with 3 GB of RAM, should make everything you do on this tablet enjoyable. Apart from any loading hiccups in areas like UX magazine, or when applications like Paper Garden were trying to load all things at once, I ran in very few cases stuttering and lagging. Moving between apps using the recent app screen didn't cause any problems. Course, you also have MultiWindow available if you really need to multitask, and it works as well as you'd expect on a Samsung flagship. Although media consumption is something you'll probably do more here, the Galaxy Tab S is able to take on everything from web browsing to remote computer access, with ease. Samsung has always made a point of putting as much as they can on their devices, and the Galaxy Tab S line is no different. media consumption is one of the main reasons to get a tablet, the inclusion of microSD scalability, which offers the possibility of up to 128 GB of extra space, is always welcome. You can get either 16 or 32 GB of built-in storage as well. LTE versions of the Tab S line are also available, which is a great advantage for anyone looking for mobile internet on their tablet, their own. is the main hole in terms of available connectivity options, but you have Bluetooth, and an IR blaster is available, which helps make your Galaxy Tab S 8.4 a great second companion screen. The design elements are the only thing making their way to the S 8.4 tab from the Samsung Galaxy S5, as you can also get a finger scanner, once again integrated into the home touch button, and create it exactly the same way as on the smartphone. The speakers come in a very welcome dual installation, and are great for in-flight use, even if they are not the loudest or richest sound available. Of course, the sound quality with headphones is expected good. Finally, as far as the battery is concerned, the Samsung Galaxy Tab S 8.4 has a 4,900 mAh capacity unit. I decided to try the battery as with taking on what this tablet was made to do, by binge watching Breaking Bad on Netflix while using Wi-Fi, for as long as I could. I got down to 25% battery life in just under 8 hours, and I was able to pass almost 15 episodes of the show. There is no doubt that the Galaxy Tab S 8.4 will be a fantastic media consumption device, and if you reduce screen time, the tablet's battery will definitely last for a very long time. As I've mentioned in previous tablet reviews, installing the camera on a tablet is often a requirement rather than a defining feature, and that's still the case here with the 8 MP rear shooter of Tab S 8.4, even when you consider that this is meant to be a flagship tablet. But that doesn't mean Samsung didn't try to do it as good as it could. As you'll see in Settings, you can get features like stabilizing software in photo and video, as well as features like HDR and Burst. The image quality is not particularly poor, although it pales in comparison to its flagship smartphone counterpart, as expected. The colors pop a little, and the detail is decent in good lighting, but it's nothing to really write the house about. I still don't see anyone consistently using a tablet's camera unless you urgently want to share something while you're working on the tablet. When it comes to software, we could see a familiar operating system, which continues from the Samsung TabPRO line of tablets, but there are some interesting additions. Despite inserting a circle-based pattern into quick settings and the Settings menu, along with switching to a more level overall profile, this is still Touchwiz, with Samsung's second home screen experience in UX magazine. from specialized widgets. It's still a very lean ecosystem, providing only so much functionality, that it has to piggy back to either Samsung's own apps or flipboard as the backend to any news or social media sources that are available. We didn't find it a game that changes in any way, since it didn't really penetrate the daily routine well enough. Then there are applications that are not only help you view super AMOLED features, but also to unify your experience across devices. SideSync isn't necessarily new, but it's still an interesting way to access your phone when you don't want to go about reaching for it. It not only gives you your notifications, but full access to everything on your smartphone. Although it is not the smoothest application, it gets the work done for several smaller general tasks. Built-in remote pc features connect to your Samsung account to have remote access to your PC at home and it works pretty well. When used on the same Wi-Fi network, it's actually very smooth, and I imagine with a fairly fast Wi-Fi connection, you can get a similar performance outside of your home network. Finally, there's Paper Garden, which is a front-end magazine that brings a print-replacement way to access your magazine subscriptions. Downloading a few magazines was pretty easy, and you get the whole publication, complete with each ad, just like with a real magazine, but it was served in a touch interface. I found that the Super AMOLED screen did justice to the zealous magazine, making the text easy to read, and images enjoyable to see. Touchwiz is still Touchwiz, but it is able to more, and exudes from this higher resolution tablet screen. Some functions are useful, while others are not, but that's something we've come to expect from Samsung devices anyway. What love is the battery life, which can go for a few seasons of a TV show, and the overall package proved a boost to the typical watch-in-bed experience.
